RESEARCH

The principle focus of my research, broadly speaking, has been in the areas of sport, at the group and community level, and sport and power, at the macro level. Methodologically, I have been a participant observer of a group of men who play softball on Sunday mornings in Queens, New York City for the past ten years or so. It has been in the last five years that I have begun to play and observe them sociologically, mostly with a symbolic interactionist-phnomenological perspective, but indebted also to Clifford Geertz's concept and method of "thick description." [See my article "Baseball, Cockfighting, and Democracy" for a demonstration of the applicability of Geertz concept for a deeper understanding of sport] Ethnographically speaking, my experience of playing with these men has been and continues to be a rich source of material for my writing and even theorizing. At the macro level, my research has been on the relationship between sport and the larger society. My recent paper, "Sport, Religion, Capitalism, and Power," is a prologue to what I envision as a larger work on the relationship between sport and society, especially relating to larger issues of how relations of power are filtered by and through sport. I view the work of theorists Antonio Gramsci on hegemony, Anthony Giddens on class structuration, as well as the work of Pierre Bourdieu and Richard Gruneau as key to this project. In this project, the bulk of my work is on the theoretical works of the above named authors, as well as more empirical works of contemporary and classic sociologists and historians such as C.L. R. James, E. P Thompson, Alan Tomlinson, John Sugden, Eric Hobsbaum, John Hargreaves, and others.

CURRENT PROJECTS:

I have two projects that I want to bring to fruition. <u>First</u>, based heavily on the articles I have written and presented at conferences over the last five years or so, I want to write a book on the sociological significance of sport, especially baseball, as it relates to culture, community, inequality of class, race/ethnicity, and gender, and social change. Such a book could serve as supplementary reading in a course in the Sociology of Sport, which I have been teaching at CPS for the last fifteen years or so. <u>Second</u>, I want to expand my paper, "Sport, Religion, Capitalism, and Power," into a book. The focus of the book would be on the complex relationship between sport and society, especially relations of power and social change. The relationship between religion and society (with Weber's *The Protestant Ethic and the Spirit of Capitalism* serving as a kind of base-line) would be the model from which the analysis would derive. Publishers such as Mellen, McFarland, and Routledge have already expressed an interest in this idea. Roger Williams of "Publish or Perish Agency" has also given me encouragement for the project, which he has agreed to edit.
