I reviewed the first and second editions of this book. Before publishing this edition, the author wrote me to ask how it could be improved. I sent him the latest edition of the extensive syllabus and bibliography of my graduate course on indexing and abstracting. The author acknowledged my assistance in the Preface, and I am frequently cited in the book. Prof. Lancaster sent me an autographed copy.

Judaica Reference Sources: A Selective, Annotated Bibliographic Guide, 3<sup>rd</sup> Revised and Expanded Edition, by Charles Cutter. Westport, CT: Libraries Unlimited, 2004. I am acknowledged on p. [xxv] for permission to reprint entries in Judaica Librarianship's feature column "Recommended Judaica Reference Works." As Editor in Chief of this journal, I contributed substantially to each column, and my work is thus reflected in this book.

Information Savvy: Tips on Organizing, Presenting, and Searching for Information in Everyday Life. Proposal and draft chapters submitted Aug. 2002 to the Vice President, Trade Division, Simon & Schuster, and Feb. 3, 2003, to an Editor of HarperCollins. The latter advised me to get a literary agent, and I have been working on this with Ita Golzman, Vice President of King Features, who is acquainted with the presidents of major trade publishers. She has explored the idea of including the book in the Dummies series. Two library science publishers have offered to handle the book, but I believe it has mass market potential, and therefore I am working on lining up a trade publisher, possibly through a literary agent.

Index to the Grolier Gazette, by Szilvia Szmuk. In January 2002, I edited the introduction and reviewed the entire index, making many suggestions for enhancing the structure and the format. I also arranged for a former indexing student of mine to implement the recommended changes. (By invitation.) The index is to be published by the Grolier Club. On Feb. 6, 2003, Dr. Szmuk informed me that the compuscript has been submitted for editing. On Feb. 12, 2004, I was informed that the index should be published by the end of the year.

The Earliest Hebrew Citation Indexes. Originally published in Journal of the American Society for Information Science (1997) and reprinted in Historical Studies in Information Science (1998). In late October 2002 I received a request for permission to have this article translated into Chinese. I granted this permission. An email from the editor dated Feb. 24, 2004, indicates that the Chinese edition has not yet appeared. I should receive a copy of the book after publication.

The Dictionary of Jewish Usage, by Sol Steinmetz. I edited sections of the book for the author, who is Executive Editor Emeritus of Random House Dictionaries. Editing completed June 28, 2001. (By invitation.) The book was originally scheduled to be published by Jason Aronson. I wrote to the publisher in March 2003 to check on the publication status of the book. In Feb. 2004 I learned that the book is to be published by Rowman & Littlefield later this year.

Cross References in Catalogs, Indexes, and Thesauri: Rationale, Structure, Format, and Control. Draft compuscript submitted to Information Today, April 2000, for refereeing. the system for that year, and subsequently received the compact disks and documentation of the 2001 edition. I then received the documentation for the 2003 edition, which I used in my seminar, April 16, 2002. I used the UMLS in my medical librarianship course as well as in my course entitled Language Structure and Thesaurus Development (formerly Language and Information), both taught at St. John's in Fall 2003. Some students have used the UMLS for their term papers.
