Every Semester Needs a Plan

Many faculty struggle to find the time to work on writing and research during the chaos that defines a typical semester. Managing our time across research, teaching, and service responsibilities can be overwhelming and, for many of us, the first thing that moves to the bottom of the 'To Do' list is writing. While there are many articles that provide suggestions for writing productivity, a recent article in the National Center for Faculty Development & Diversity, entitled *Every Semester Needs a Plan*, was particularly helpful. The article, which is part of the Monday Motivator series, suggests three steps to help faculty make progress on their writing agenda. While the article is geared toward junior faculty, all faculty can benefit from the message.

Circle of Change Leadership Conference

With great excitement, University Career Services is happy to announce a partnership that will bring the Circle of Change Leadership Conference to New York City, specifically the Queens campus, in March of 2019. For the past year, we have been working to become host of the 1st Annual Circle of Change Leadership Conference on the East Coast, an event that until now has been hosted only in California. For two days, student leaders will not only discover the leader from within and develop the leadership and professional skills necessary to attain career leadership success after graduation, but they will learn from dynamic keynote speakers, engage in leadership development sessions with certified leadership coaches, participate in a professional development boot camp with a top recruiter from Conde Nast, and will connect and learn from top industry professionals from various professions and areas of expertise within New York City to acquire the professional and leadership skills necessary to thrive as a leader after graduation.

Big Interview

According to a report by the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE), 55% of employers surveyed are moving away from in person and/or on campus interviews to using virtual platforms to evaluate candidates in the first-round. This trend is confirmed and expanded on by Forbes, who wrote that, "Job seekers will use AI platforms for a high-impact job search," and "Video submissions will be the first-line candidate filter."

To ensure our students are prepared for this trend, we have taken steps to add necessary technology to interview spaces that allow for students to reserve quiet space for such interviews, and have partnered with Big Interview to offer students a platform on which to practice.

Big Interview is an online interview practice tool that can be used from any computer with a webcam. First launched by Career Services in fall 2017, Big Interview provides students an opportunity to practice tough interviewing questions giving them the ability to record, review, and share their answers with career advisors and faculty for feedback. Students can choose from dozens of interview sets in over 20 different industries/majors, and utilize nearly 40 lessons to learn all the best interviewing techniques. Big Interview is accessible to all students on the MySJU Career Services tab.

Faculty Partnership

Over the past year we have piloted the use of Big Interview with faculty to create assignments tailored to curriculum. This past fall two sections of Public Speaking and a Sport Management Student Seminar course used the platform to assess students' ability to present virtually, a skill necessary in today's work environment. Students were asked to respond to five prompts that required them to think about their own experience in the following career competency areas: communication skills, critical thinking, leadership, hard work, and professionalism.

A five-point Likert scale is then utilized to assess students' responses in verbal and non-verbal categories, including if they answer the question well, speak clearly, utilize steady eye-contact and appropriate body language.

The feedback from the faculty was overwhelmingly positive in regards to not only how important this tool is, but also how easy it is to use. Catholic Relief Global Campus Faculty Development Grants

The Office of the Provost and University Mission announce the following 2019–20 Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Global Campus faculty development grants as part of St. John's CRS Global Campus efforts. As a University, St. John's shares CRS's commitment to promote sustainable development, respond to emergencies, fight disease and poverty, and nurture peaceful and just societies. These faculty development programs seek to promote academic research in support of this shared global mission.

The **Faculty Global Grant** is intended to support new and ongoing mission-driven global research by St. John's University faculty. This program facilitates faculty participation in the global mission of the University and the application of faculty expertise to St. John's as a CRS Global Campus. This research grant is for up to \$2,500. The application is due March 15.

The **Faculty Global Conference Grant** is intended to support new and ongoing mission-driven global research by St. John's University faculty. This conference grant of up to \$1,000 will go toward the cost of travel and related conference fees for a conference tied to St. John's CRS Global mission: to promote sustainable development, respond to emergencies, fight disease and poverty, and nurture peaceful and just societies. **The application** is due March 15.

Online Teaching Essentials

Online Teaching Essentials (OTE) is a great course for foundational training in online teaching. Taught

by experienced St. John's faculty, OTE is the primary method for certification to teach any of the University's fully online or hybrid courses. Lasting only four weeks, OTE is a quick course with no required login dates/times. Participants will experience the perspective of the online student by participating at their own pace, as long as all weekly assignments are submitted by their set deadlines. Participants who successfully complete the course will obtain certification as well as the necessary skills and confidence to teach any online or hybrid course.



The spring section of OTE will run from 3/18/19 - 4/14/19.

Advanced Online Teaching Strategies



Advanced Online Teaching Strategies (AOTS) is an excellent course for learning fresh, new ways to excite and engage your students. Taught by experienced St. John's faculty, participants emerge from AOTS with the skills to apply new concepts to learning management platforms beyond Blackboard. Lasting only three weeks, AOTS is a quick course in which participants are not confined to a set schedule; they may participate at their own pace, with no required login dates/times, as long as all assignments are submitted by their set deadlines. At the

end of the course, faculty will receive a certificate of completion and will have gained advanced skills to better engage their students.

The spring section of AOTS will run from 3/18/19 - 4/7/19.

It is important that the presentations in an online course are of good quality and appropriate to the pedagogy being applied. Posting slides alone, absent the background information delivered by the instructor in a face-to-face course, can degrade the value of the information being presented, or even cause more confusion in students. Narrating your PowerPoint presentations is a way to ensure that your students get the most out of the course materials you are posting. This workshop will include best practices for recording voice over your PowerPoint presentations and demonstrate how you can accomplish this using Panopto.
