ABOUT THE INTERDISCIPLINARY MINOR IN NEW YORK STUDIES

If you are a native New Yorker or a newcomer to the city with a passion for the history, social life, and culture of the Big Apple, the 18-credit interdisciplinary minor in New York Studies will complement your major field of study. The minor explores the city from the perspective of various academic disciplines such as anthropology, art, television and film, economics, government, environmental studies, history, and theology.

In Discover New York, you are introduced to the city through the lens of a particular discipline, focusing on themes of immigration, race/ ethnicity, religion, wealth and poverty, and the environment. You may also take an Archaeological Fieldwork course, surveying or excavating sites throughout the city's five boroughs under the guidance of Anthropology faculty members. In Art in New York, you tour the city's major galleries and museums to view their collections. Other minor courses feature New York's neighborhoods, people, natural history, and political dynamics. Most include field trips; you'll head off campus and make New York City your classroom.

WHAT CAN I DO WITH A MINOR IN NEW YORK STUDIES?

Due to the interdisciplinary nature of the minor, you develop an understanding of urban studies through a wide range of disciplines, using New York City as context for your studies. This broad approach to a subject of interest helps prepare you in the methods of inquiry and problem-solving that are invaluable to success in today's global and interdependent fields. With a rich knowledge of the city of New York and its far-reaching legacy and influences, you have a strong foundation for any work related to urban life, development, culture, and history.
