The objectives of the department are: to provide students with a sound preparation in psychology, appropriate to their level (i.e., undergraduate or graduate); to stress the scientific foundations of the discipline, so that students gain an understanding of the psychological, social, and biological processes underlying normal and abnormal behavior; to foster students' ability to think critically and to integrate theory with research; and to intensify the discovery and understanding of the interaction of human behavior. In its professional programs, the department has the added objective of fostering the highest standards of professional practice and ethical conduct.

Undergraduates may also participate as research assistants in ongoing research projects being conducted by faculty members in the department. In the past, many students have presented their research at Psychology Conferences and in some cases they have co-authored a published article based on their research participation. ^{*} A minimum of 28 credits of Free Electives are required for the Psychology program. The total number of credits required for the degree is 126. However, this total might vary slightly depending on the courses taken to complete the Free Electives, St. John's College Core Elective requirement, and the two courses in the major which are four-credit courses. Most Psychology majors take 30 free electives and 128 credits for the BA degree. Regardless, the student must complete all requirements and finish a

minimum of 126 credits with at least a 2.0 in both their overall and major indices to be eligible for a Bachelor of Arts degree.
